A Letter from the Executive Director:

Thanks to you, this past year was a record one for Partners In Ministry by any measure. In 2019, Partners In Ministry (PIM) had the privilege of supporting Scotland, Richmond, and Robeson Counties by *instilling hope and empowering change, one family at a time*. As we reflect on this past year of service, it becomes even more evident how important it was to deepen and strengthen our commitment to nurture, equip, and unlock the potential of youth and children; to empower and strengthen families; and to build and sustain healthy communities through academic enrichment, spiritual growth, advocacy and the coordination of services.

PIM's comprehensive programs provided essential support and empowerment services to the region's youth and families who are entrenched in cycles of poverty, hunger, and housing insecurity. A two-pronged approach, PIM's programs shore up the basic needs of safe housing and food access, while concurrently addressing educational and economic inequity, college & career preparedness, job readiness, and connection to community support.

While these programs have been highly successful and maintained their quality as we've grown over the past fourteen years, the need for increased services and programming still outstrips our current capacity and available space. To this end, the PIM Board of Directors determined that a **Community Education Center** was an absolute necessity to support our growing organization and the needs of our region. Consequently, we have embarked upon a campus expansion to build a 20,000 square foot multi-purpose center on our debt-free campus. In 2018-2019, we actively engaged funding partners during our silent building phase, and in 2020, we are moving forward into our public phase. The **Community Education Center** symbolizes a deepened commitment to our community and will help PIM expand its reach and impact the health and well-being of over 8,000 youth and families, while dramatically enhancing and improving their programmatic opportunities.

This community hub will also accelerate our investment in economic and community development by empowering those we serve through our enriched programs and services. The **Community Education Center** will provide a dedicated, safe space with the following essential program enhancements: a Gymnasium; a Stage for performances and assemblies; accommodations for an Emergency Shelter; Classroom Space for youth and parenting classes, family meetings, and senior activities; a Media Center; a Computer/STEM lab; a Teen Center; a Counseling Center; and a commercial kitchen/cafeteria for food preparation and dining. Once completed, our facility will be the hub of connectivity and programming for our communities' most vulnerable populations, especially given the lack of comparable facilities anywhere in our area.

Thanks to your generous gifts of time, technical and financial resources in support of this vital ministry, we have been able to touch the lives of thousands of individuals who are most in need of help. Please continue to follow our progress, and thanks in advance for your support and commitment as we help transform students and families who are excited to succeed in the years ahead.

PROGRAMS AND SERVICES

Partners In Ministry is a “***One-Stop Resource and Referral Center***”, which serves as a safe, healthy place, free of drugs and violence for at-risk youth and their families to develop academic, social, and cultural life-long skills, that are essential to positively impact their community. Our goal is to help break the cycle of poverty by providing a “hand-up” approach rather than “hand-out” for each person to find success. To this end, the ministry offers four signature programs:

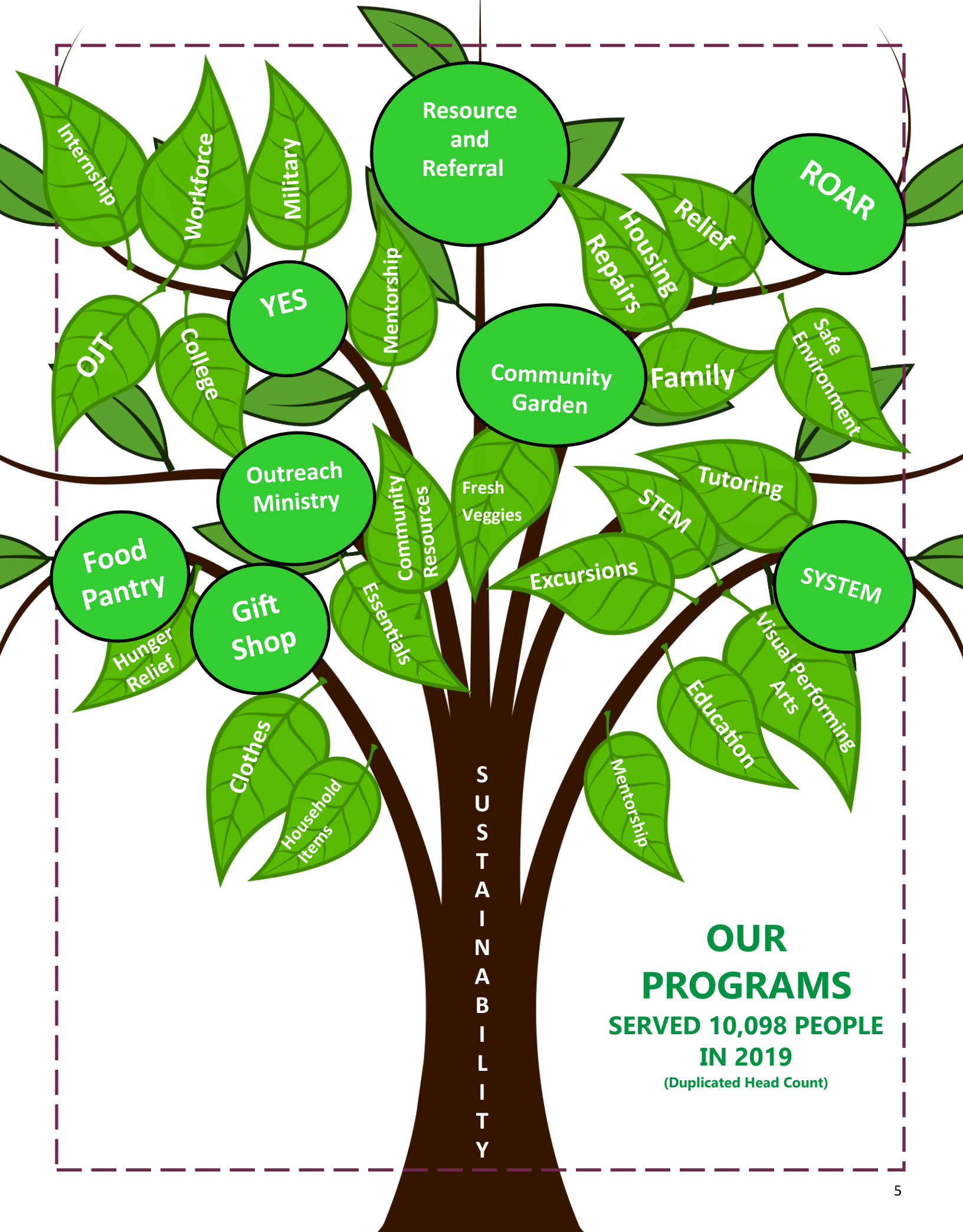
SYSTEM (*Strengthening Youth in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math*) is a year-round after-school and summer program providing a structured learning environment for at-risk 3rd through 8th graders performing in the 40th percentile or below in reading and math. Our primary goals are to assist at-risk students to close the academic achievement gap in reading and mathematics by helping students reach academic proficiency and/or meet state and local performance standards. Participants also develop job readiness skillsets needed to make informed decisions about pathways in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) fields through the SYSTEM Program. The Program incorporates creative hands-on activities, minds-on exposure, and nurture in STEM education. Project-based learning and inquiry-based instruction are used to prepare participants to become more enthusiastic about STEM learning opportunities. Participants are actively engaged in enrichment activities, community service learning projects, visual and performing arts, physical fitness, healthy eating, and life skill activities which help develop the holistic person.

The **YES (*Youth Empowered to Succeed*)** Program targets at-risk youth (ages 13-24) in Richmond and Scotland counties who are facing challenges such as school dropouts, literacy skills deficiencies, homelessness, pregnancy, offenders, completion of an educational program, or securing a job. The YES Program prepares the youth through three pathways: two-year and four-year secondary education through colleges and universities, enlisting in the military, or entering the workforce. The Program serves as the first point of contact for in-school and out-of-school youth, as well as out-of-work youth. The YES Program offers workforce preparedness, education, and training necessary to meet the needs of regional employers.

The **ROAR (*Rehab Outreach & Recovery*)** Program advocates for a safe and healthy living environment for families living in Robeson, Richmond, and Scotland counties and targets elderly, disabled, veteran, single-parent, and low-income households with special needs. The Program addresses the housing conditions that pose imminent safety threats and provides urgent repairs to prevent displacement. ROAR combats community deterioration by repairing substandard homes in blighted neighborhoods which guards against future deterioration.

The **Food Pantry** is a way that PIM can help ensure the health, safety, and food security for our communities. Together with our partners, we offer healthy solutions to provide hunger relief in the communities we serve. Volunteers and participants from our YES Program operate the Food Pantry.

On March 31, Partners In Ministry (PIM) was approved to become the first and only National Mission Institution in the North Carolina Conference. National Mission Institutions (NMIs) respond to the needs of marginalized and vulnerable communities. Partners In Ministry is now one of the 90 National Mission Institutions in the United States that advocates for women, cares for children, educates youth, houses the neglected, advocates for social justice issues, creates economic opportunities, and changes neighborhoods. The National Office of the United Methodist Women assists these institutions through grants, technical support, and member involvement.

WHEREAS, in March 2019, Partners In Ministry was named a National Mission Institution, which are organizations under the United Methodist Women recognized for empowering women, caring for children, educating and building youth, looking after the neglected, advocating for social justice issues, creating economic opportunities and changing neighborhoods.


WHEREAS, there are less than 100 National Mission Institutions in the United States and Partners In Ministry is the only one in the eastern portion of North Carolina.

STRENGTHENING YOUTH THROUGH SCIENCE, TECHNOLOGY, ENGINEERING, & MATH (SYSTEM)

SYSTEM is making a difference in the community by actively and creatively engaging students in a structured after-school program which focuses on grade level benchmarks aligned with the NC Common Core Standards and expanding learning in STEM education.



During the 2018/2019 school year, over 300 students were enrolled in the **SYSTEM** After-school Academic Enrichment Program. **SYSTEM** served all six (6) elementary (grades 3-5) and two (2) middle schools (grades 6-8) in the Scotland County School (SCS) system.

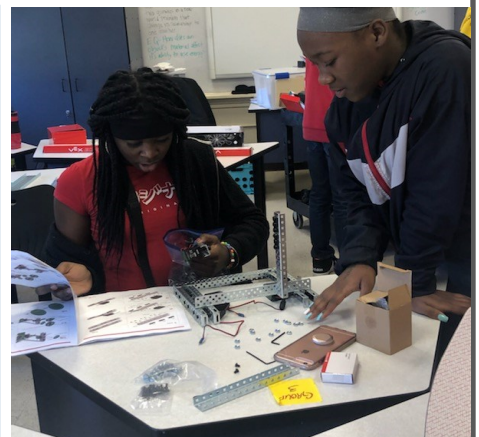
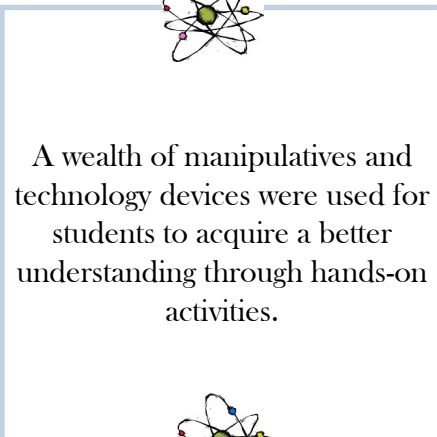
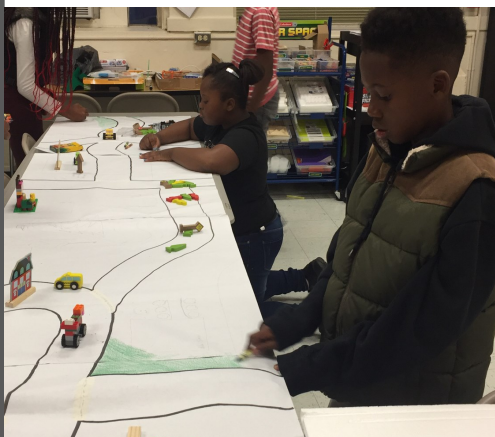
SYSTEM ACTIVITIES

In 2019, SYSTEM set goals to increase their students' reading and math scores by 5 points or more. Throughout the 2019 academic year, over 62% of the participants gained 5 points or more in math and reading. Additionally, 71% of participants showed an increased on the post-assessments in STEM subjects.



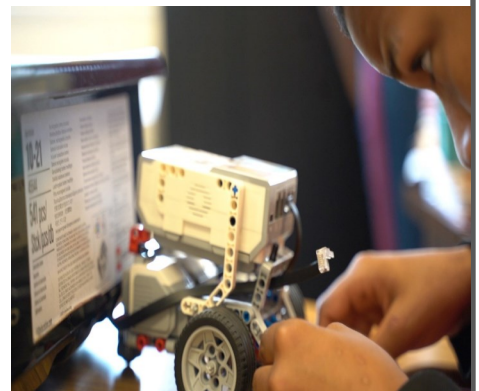
Teachers used a variety of resources, learning styles, and interventions to ensure students mastered skills.

Participants were engaged in hands-on STEM projects that promoted adventure and made learning relevant and fun.



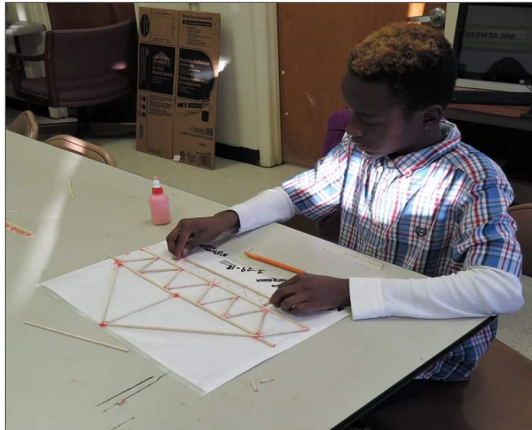

Additionally, class projects focused on water purification, water cycle, and aerospace design.

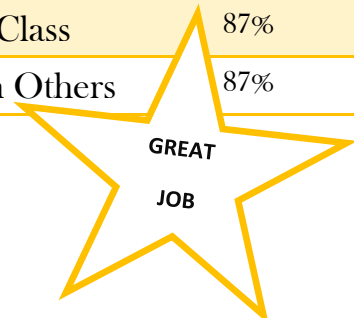

CAMP STEMulation

During the 2019 summer, there were 110 students in the SYSTEM Camp STEMulation, which operated from June 19, 2019 through July 23, 2019.

Camp STEMulation III offered 5 weeks of learning and fun activities for the participants. Camp STEMulation III included a different theme each week.



"Young Inventors/Innovators Showcase"



The different themes allowed students to conduct research, use inquiry, and project based learning to make connections between the real world and solving real life problems. During the first week of summer activities, students learned about coding and the technology behind robots.



"Gardening, Food for Thought"



This theme exposed students to terminology used in agriculture and marketing food.

Students were asked the question, "How does food get to the market?"

Students learned the many ways to grow and distribute food.

"Fun with Coding and Robots"



Coding empowers young children to consume digital technology but also be the producers of it. Students developed cognitive skills and learned logical and sequential thought processes.

Robotics education allowed students to learn valuable problem-solving STEM skills in math and science.

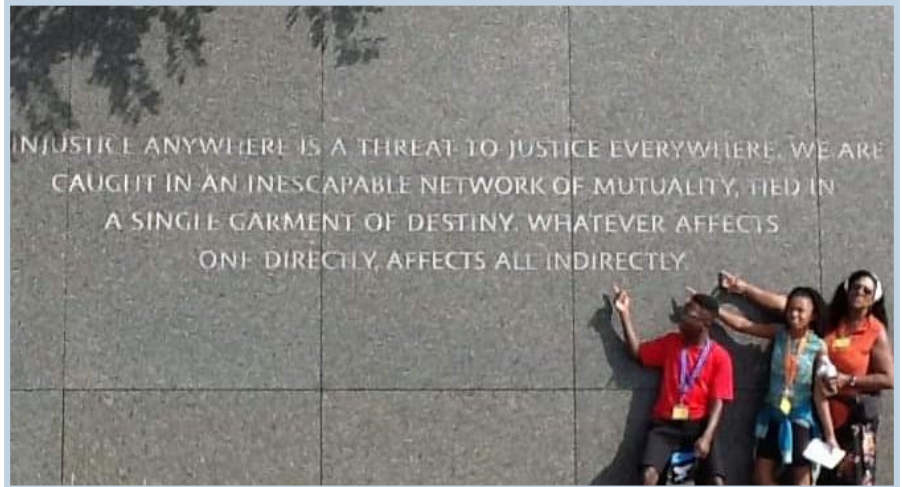
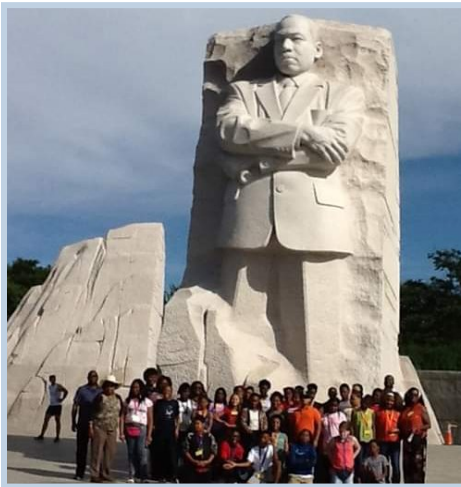
"Water Scarcity: A Global Crisis"

CAMP STEMulation FUN ACTIVITIES



SYSTEM youth participated in a fun excursion to The Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial site located in Washington, D.C. to learn the history of the Civil Rights Movement and Dr. King's legacy serving as a monument to the freedom, opportunity and justice for which he stood.



SYSTEM students traveled to Camp Rockfish, a place where fun is experienced, faith is developed, and friendships are made. Students were able to engage in fun activities like fishing and archery.



Scotland County Memorial Hospital staff held a wellness workshop to discuss nutrition, feeding and sleep schedules, all of which can be challenging during developmental stages.

Youth Empowered to Succeed (YES)

The YES Program is a work-ready training pathway initiative that prepares youth for the job opportunities that our local and regional employers are seeking. The Program's goals are to keep youth in school, focus on a career path, and graduate on-time. YES has two main programs: The **Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (W.I.O.A.)** and the **Juvenile Crime Prevention Council (J.C.P.C.)**. These programs seek to help close the employment gap by partnering with businesses, industries, and community colleges to develop youth employment pathways that bridge the skills gaps in the region.



The YES program empowers youth by instilling a strong work ethic. Youth are provided opportunities to explore alternate career options through paid work experience, internships, and on-the-job training (OJT); and are encouraged to participate in service-learning interventions that will connect community service experience with academic learning, personal and spiritual growth, and civic responsibilities.



YES PROGRAM ACTIVITIES



YES served 106 youth in 2018/2019. YES enrolled 94 youth in the W.I.O.A. Program. Youth were engaged in various employment and training workshops, tutoring, mentoring, school/college tours, entrepreneurship opportunities, learning excursions, and fun activities that contributed to their overall educational and leadership development. These opportunities have afforded the youth unique experiences that nurture their social and emotional growth.

W.I.O.A. COMMUNITY SERVICE HOURS

Richmond and Scotland county participants served over 6,000 community services hours.



The YES program is designed to offer youth an opportunity to develop an awareness of issues that impact their lives and their communities. The program helps to develop habits and tools for ethical and moral decision-making; and leadership skills. YES participants spent time with the elderly, feeding the homeless, and social building within the community. Youth were also engaged in community service through the Food Pantry and the community garden where the importance of fresh produce for healthy living is instilled.



Through these services, youth learn about economic, social, and environmental justice in their communities.

JUVENILE CRIME PREVENTION AND COUNCIL (J.C.P.C.)

The J.C.P.C. program is a mentorship program which provides early intervention for at-risk youth. This program provides early intervention in the lives of at-risk youth and focuses on prevention measures to deter the “School To Prison Pipeline.”

Through this leadership program, youth are prepared to become change agents and make a difference in their own communities, through community services such as working in our community gardens, food pantry, thrift store, and housing ministry.



Workshops are coordinated amongst mentors and their mentees.



The youth exercised team building and social behavior.

The mentors spent over 1,300 hours with 12 at-risk youth. Youth and mentors participated in team building exercises where a group of youth could work together effectively as a team. Team building helped youth create a stronger bond among their peers and mentors. The youth and mentors shared common goals and expectations, which helped them learn to respect and appreciate their differences.

Rehab Outreach And Recovery (ROAR)

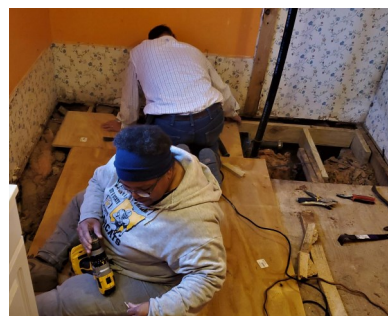
The Rehab Outreach And Recovery (ROAR) Housing Program is an advocate for safe and healthy living environments for families. ROAR utilizes mission teams such as churches, college students, youth groups, and contractors. ROAR serves the community with two housing programs: The Urgent Home Repair Program and the Disaster Relief Program.

The **Urgent Home Repair Program** assists low-income home owners with urgent repairs, eliminating health, safety, and environmental hazards for residents who are elderly, veterans, handicapped, or disabled. The program ensures that homeowners are not displaced due to hazardous living conditions.

The **Disaster Relief Program** serves homeowners impacted by a declared disaster. ROAR is committed to helping families to rebuild their homes, their communities, and their lives.

DISASTER RELIEF

Partners In Ministry plays a significant and critical role in times of disaster. After **Hurricane Matthew and Hurricane Florence**, ROAR was prepared to respond to clients whose homes were affected by these natural disasters.

The **Disaster Relief Program** was able to provide effective service to participants and repair their damaged homes by restoring a safe and healthy living environment, combating community deterioration and housing conditions that pose imminent threats to the community members' lives and/or safety that could cause displacement.

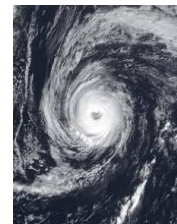

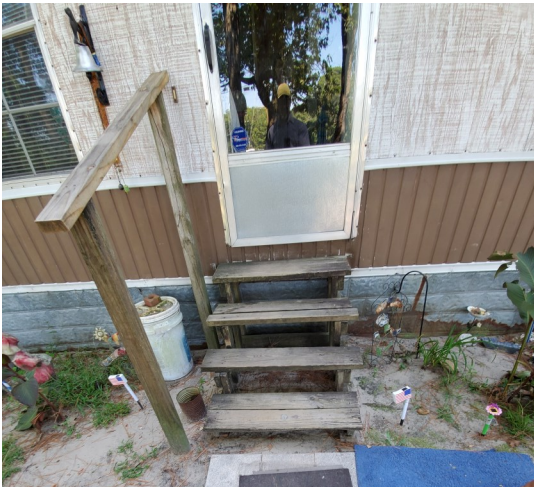

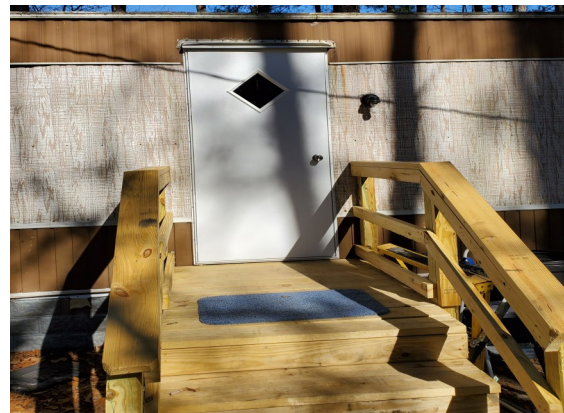
The ROAR Program offers more than home repairs to improve or modernize clients' homes. It also provides satisfaction and a group of mission teams that are passionate about their work.

ROAR Mission Teams experience more than just time spent on the job site, but also various activities such as preparing meals, cleaning up afterwards, morning and evening devotionals, and community interaction. Mission Teams are encouraged to develop and nurture relationships with the community, the ROAR staff members, and community churches. Mission Teams are asked to worship with the staff members at least once during their experience, whenever possible.

RESOURCE AND REFERRAL CENTER FOOD PANTRY/MEALS

Our Food Pantry is a way that we can help ensure the health, safety, and food security of our communities. PIM offers three types of food distributions, each requiring a completed application and the intake process is available on a walk-in basis.

The R&R Center offers three distributions:

Food Pantry distribution- There are no income requirements. Food boxes are available to any family in need of fresh, free food.



The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP)- Recipients must meet the income guidelines of the North Carolina poverty level and must be eligible to receive or already receives Food Stamps.

Senior Commodity Box- Recipients must be 65 years or older, or receive a disability check and income must be verified.

SERVICE



In 2019, an average of 65 seniors citizens and young adults participated weekly in PIM's Outreach Ministry.

Through partnership with the United Healthcare, many participants were able to enroll in a healthcare plan and receive over 300 items in giveaways. PIM partnered with Richmond Community College (RCC) to help participants in obtaining a GED/Adult Diploma and/or Class A Commercial Drivers License (CDL).

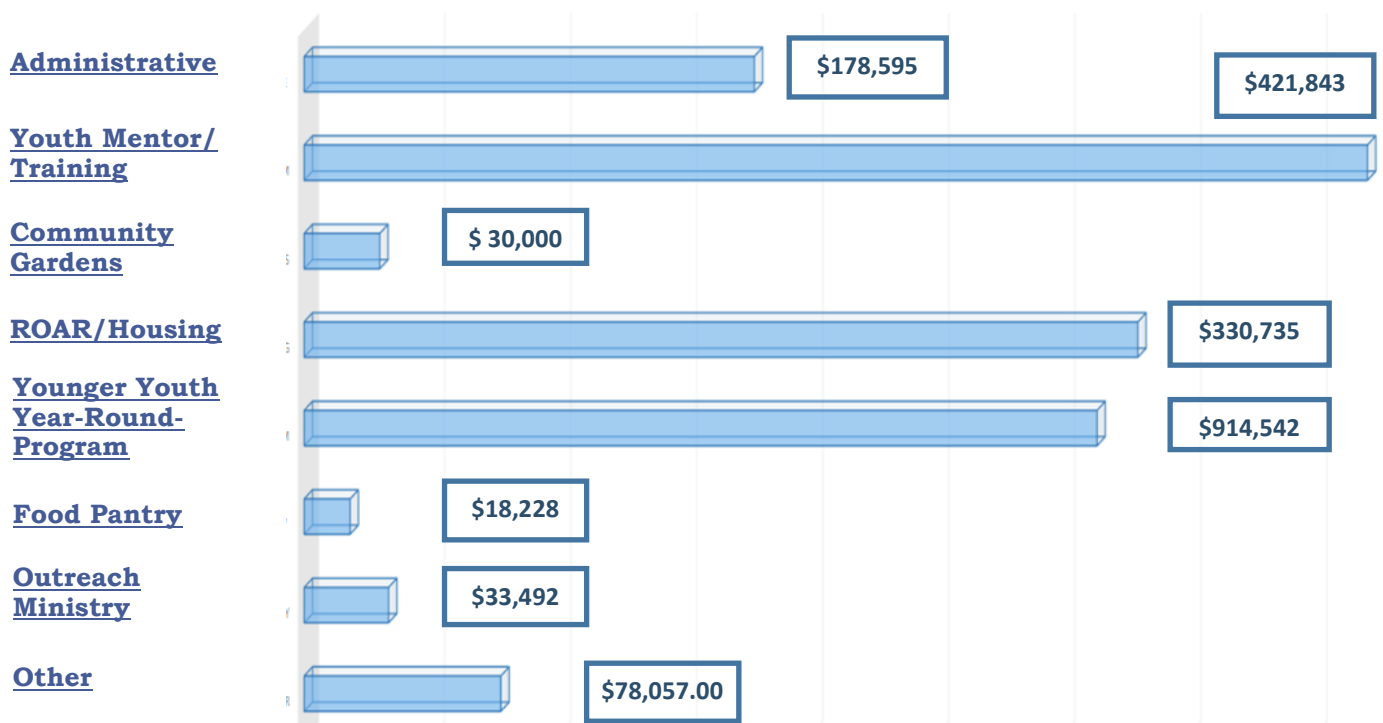

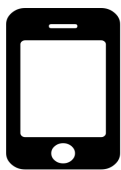

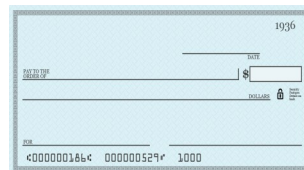
